- 1. URBAN TASKFORCE FOR TAURANGA INCORPORATED (UTF) wishes to be a party to the following proceedings: ENV-2024-AKL-000049, KiwiRail Holdings Limited v Bay of Plenty Regional Council, being an appeal under Clause 14(1) of Schedule 1 of the Act on the Proposed Change 6 (National Policy Statement for Urban Development) to the Bay of Plenty's Regional Policy Statement (RPS).
- 2. UTF made a submission about the subject matter of the proceedings.
- 3. UTF is not a trade competitor for the purposes of section 308C or 308CA of the Act.
- 4. UTF is interested in all of the proceedings, particularly in regards to the reverse sensitivity provisions sought.
- 5. UTF opposes the relief sought by the appellant because:
  - (Council) proposed change to clause 2.8.1(9). The change provided that stress on transport infrastructure arising from intensive urban development will occur unless undertaken in conjunction with well-planned transport improvement. Council's proposed wording promotes intensive urban development by providing that transport infrastructure can be improved to meet development demands. In contrast the appellant's desired relief shifts the focus away from intensive urban development and may restrict opportunities for these types of developments by

requiring management of the interaction between conflicting uses.

- The addition of the criterion in policy UG 7A and other provisions (b) requiring urban development proposals to avoid reserve sensitivity effects on the safe and efficient operation of transport corridors may constrain opportunities for alternative and potentially more advantageous urban development proposals. This is inconsistent with the National Policy Statement for Urban Development as it may restrict urban development proposals that contribute significantly to development capacity and contribute to well-functioning urban environments.
- 6. UTF agrees to participate in mediation or other alternative dispute resolution of the proceedings.
